

Community Strategy Refresh Consultation Report

Summary

Over a 15 week consultation period, the Trafford Partnership consulted local residents, businesses, public service providers, voluntary and community groups and elected members about their vision for Trafford as a place to live, learn, work and relax in 2021.

In total, 1567 comments were received and dealt with. The majority of these came from members of the public through neighbourhood forums, individual feedback and the web consultation. The comments were treated in a number of ways: mainly referred to relevant partnerships or organisations, incorporated or were already included.

All the comments were analysed and grouped by theme (see Appendix 1). Just over one fifth weren't specifically related to any of the themes, however, of the remaining, the most frequently made comments were on the economy, environment, transport and neighbourhoods.

The Trafford Partnership also carried out an online survey to gauge agreement with the draft commitments of the Sustainable Community Strategy. Of those who responded, 85% were in overall agreement with the draft vision and priorities.

Introduction

In January 2006, the Trafford Partnership launched its existing Community Strategy "**Trafford 2021 a Blueprint**", setting out a vision for Trafford and a number of commitments to achieve this vision.

In 2007, the changing national policy context driven by the Government White Paper, 'Stronger and Prosperous Communities', led to a decision by the Trafford Partnership to refresh the Community Strategy. The key reasons for why it was considered crucial to refresh the Community Strategy were:

- **To ensure it is sustainable and supports sustainable communities:** Government has set the challenge to turn existing community strategies into Sustainable Community Strategies "which develop a stronger focus on integrating social, economic and environmental issues and in tackling the area's longer-term and more global impacts". The refresh of Trafford's Community Strategy was designed to test the long term sustainability of Trafford's Communities against eight agreed criteria (see Appendix 2) by engaging local people, partners and other stakeholders through consultation and dialogue.
- **More focus on Trafford's neighbourhoods:** A recognised area of improvement for Trafford's existing Community Strategy was the need to create more of a neighbourhood focus. Since the previous consultation on the Community Strategy in the autumn/winter of 2005-06, the mechanism for engaging local people has become more comprehensive and neighbourhood based through the development of eight neighbourhood forums. The refresh gave the Partnership the opportunity to engage local members and communities through these fora to review the vision and priorities for Trafford and for their local area.

- **New Local Area Agreements (LAA):** Local Area Agreements are essentially agreements between local partners and Government which identify key priorities for improving the quality of life in an area and set targets for improvement over a three year period. Following Government proposals, new LAAs will be introduced from June 2008. The LAA for 2008 onwards is a major delivery mechanism for the Sustainable Community Strategy and in achieving the Borough's long term ambitions. It is therefore essential that it is based on the most up to date evaluation of the vision, commitments and priorities of Trafford's neighbourhoods and thematic partnerships which are set out in Trafford's Sustainable Community Strategy.

Aims of the Consultation

As part of the refresh of the Community Strategy, the Trafford Partnership wanted to consult local people, businesses and key public, private, voluntary and community sector partners to test whether the vision and priorities for Trafford were still relevant for the place we want Trafford to be in 2021 as a place to live, learn, work and relax.

The consultation was designed to ensure that everyone's views would inform the vision and priorities for Trafford and form the basis of a refreshed Sustainable Community Strategy.

Methodology

The following groups were consulted as part of the consultation process:

Consultation Outline

The Trafford Partnership carried out a 15 week public consultation which was split into two phases: phase one which ran from 22nd October to 11th December 2007; and phase two which ran from 4th to 19th February 2008.

Phase One Consultation

Phase one of the consultation was focused on receiving feedback from local people via the Neighbourhood Forums and thematic partnerships on the relevance of the community strategy vision and priorities, what is missing, and how the priorities could be better reflected.

- **Neighbourhood Forum Consultation**

Local residents and stakeholders were consulted at each of the eight Neighbourhood Forums between 13th November and 11th December 2007. Each Forum was presented with statistical information about their area as a place to Live, Learn, Work and Relax. This information included population data, house types, housing affordability, car ownership, school attainment, qualifications, economic activity, occupation, benefit claimants, average household income, and information from the Residents Tracker Survey.

For each of the themes of Live, Learn, Work and Relax the audience were asked the following questions:

- What's missing?
- What are the issues for the area?
- How can the above issues be reflected?

At the end of the presentation residents were asked about their neighbourhood specifically:

- Does this feel like your neighbourhood?
- What would you want your neighbourhood to be like in 2021?
- What are the six most important issues for the next three years?

All the comments made at each Neighbourhood Forum were recorded and have influenced the development of the refreshed Community Strategy.

- **Individual Neighbourhood Forum Feedback**

Members of the public attending the Neighbourhood Forums were also given feedback forms to provide any further information on the questions asked in the meetings.

- **Thematic Partnerships**

Presentations were made at each of the Thematic Partnerships to find out whether or not each of the thematic partnerships' priorities were still reflected in the Partnership's vision and in each of the themes of Live, Learn, Work and Relax.

- **Diverse Communities Forums**

The Voice of BME, the Faith Forum and the Disability Forum were each consulted to find out from their perspective if anything was missing from the community strategy, what their issues are, and how these issues could be reflected for each of the themes of the Community Strategy.

Post-Phase One Consultation

- **Trafford Council Executive**

On 14th January 2008 the Trafford Council Executive was consulted to receive their feedback on the draft vision and commitments and to ask members what they think should be Trafford's priorities for action and who should be responsible for delivering these priorities.

- **Trafford Partnership Board**

On 21st January 2008 the Board received a presentation of proposed revisions to the current Community Strategy vision and commitments across the 4 themes of Live, Learn, Work and Relax for their consideration and comment.

Phase Two Consultation

- **Web Consultation**

A web based survey was carried out between 4th and 19th February using the Trafford Council website. The survey was publicised widely in the local media, through partners and at the Neighbourhoods and Diverse Communities Event. Respondents were asked to consider the draft vision and priorities and say whether they agreed with these for Trafford as a place to live, learn, work and relax in 2021.

- **Children and Young People's Event**

We attended a Children and Young People's Event held at the Waterside Arts Centre on 1st February. The young people attending the event were asked whether or not they agreed with the Vision for Trafford and what the most important things are for them about Trafford as a place to Live, Learn, Work, and Relax now and in 2021.

- **Neighbourhoods and Diverse Communities Event**

On 6th February 2008 an event was held specifically for members of the community who had attended the Neighbourhood Fora in phase one of the consultation and for members of the diverse communities fora. In total, 74 people from the community and partner organisations attended the event.

The draft refreshed commitments and outcomes were presented for each of the themes of Live, Learn, Work and Relax. As with the consultation at the Neighbourhood Fora, members of the audience were asked for each theme:

- What's missing?
- Is there anything included that shouldn't be?
- How might priorities be better reflected?

- **Neighbourhoods and Diverse Communities Feedback**

Delegates at the Neighbourhoods and Diverse Communities Event were also given individual feedback forms and asked to return these with further comments on the draft refreshed Vision and commitments.

- **Thematic Partnerships**

The Thematic Partnerships were contacted and asked to provide direct feedback on draft refreshed vision, outcomes and commitments.

- **Chairs of the Town Centre Partnerships**

On 18th February 2008 a meeting was held with the chairs of the Town Centre Partnerships to receive their feedback on the draft refreshed vision and commitments. In particular:

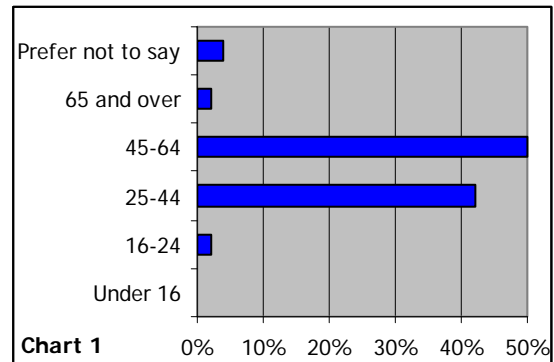
- What is missing?
- Is there anything included that shouldn't be?
- How might priorities be better reflected?

Summary of Findings

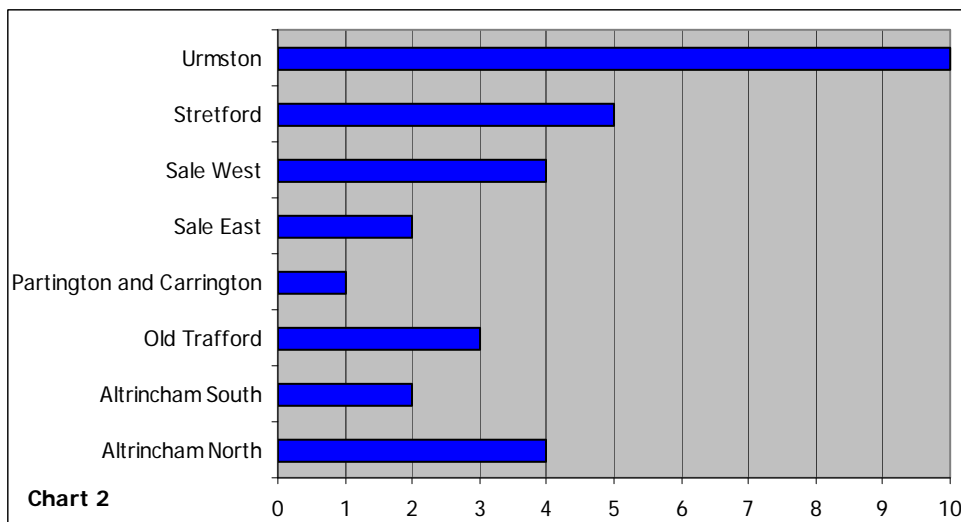
Web Consultation

- 58 people filled in the online questionnaire. Of those who responded:

- 28 people were male and 24 were female.
- The majority of people who filled in the questionnaire were White (48 out of 50 respondents) and aged between 25 and 64 years of age (see Chart 1).

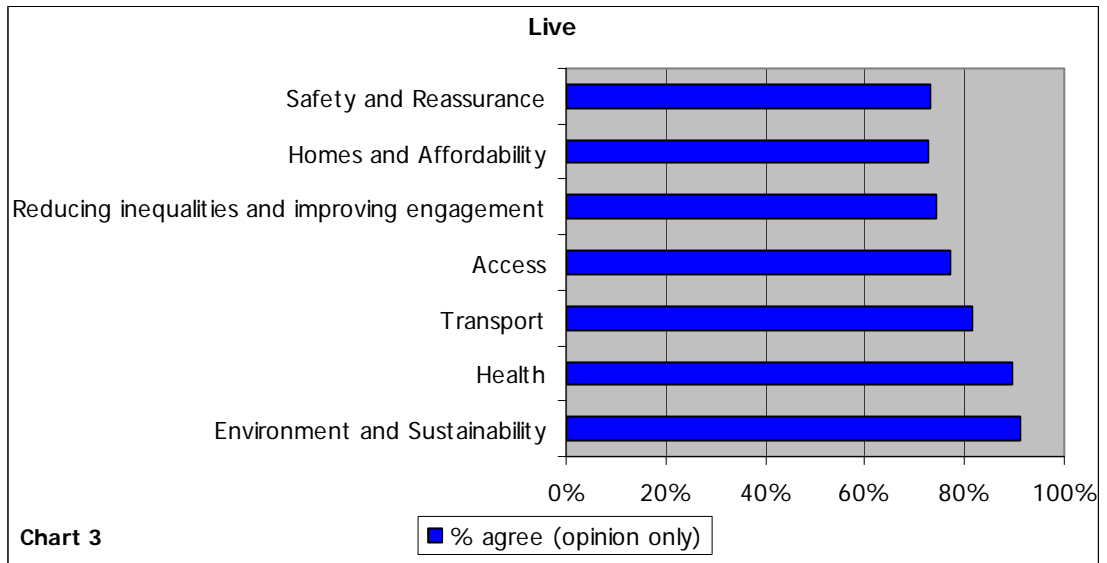


- The majority of people who responded do not have a disability: just 3 people said they did and 2 said they would prefer not to say.
- The responses covered all the neighbourhood forum areas, however, the most responses were received from Urmston (10 people) (see Chart 2).

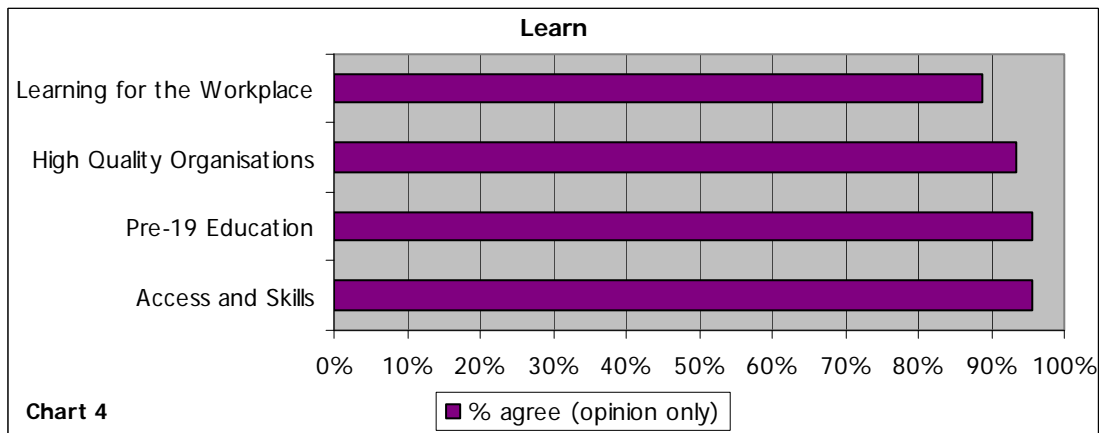


- Of those who expressed an opinion, 85% of people overall were in agreement with the draft vision and priorities.

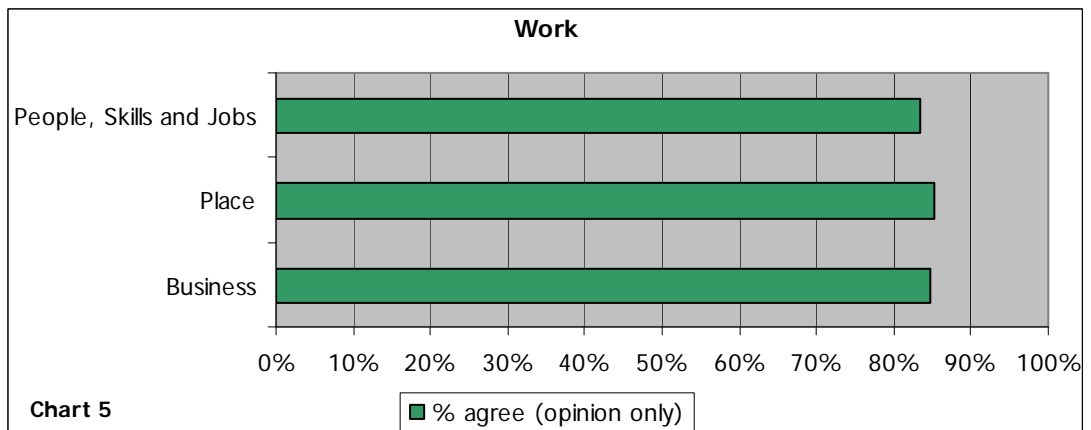
- 77% of respondents agreed with the draft vision for Trafford.
- On average, 80% of people who expressed an opinion agreed with the priorities under Live. Across the priorities in this section, there was generally high agreement ranging from 73% to 91% agreement (see Chart 3).



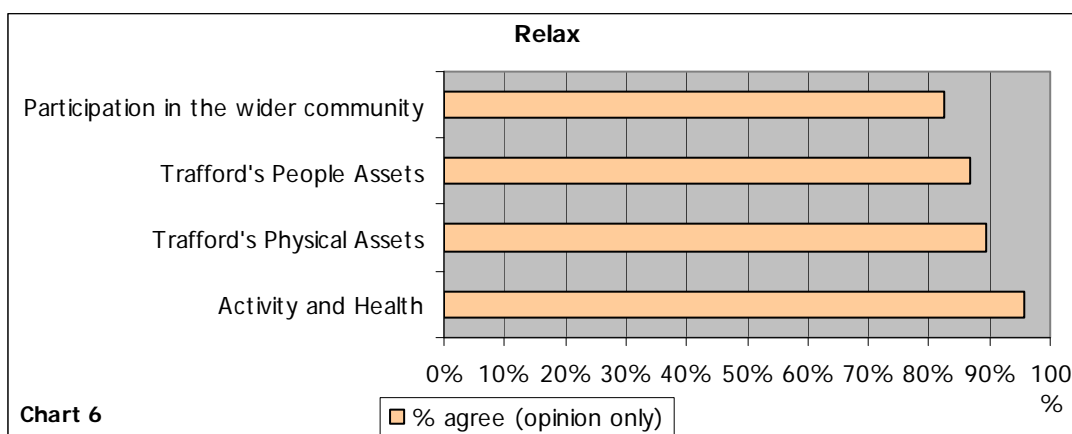
- On average, 93% of people who expressed an opinion agreed with the priorities in the Learn section. There was a high level of agreement with all the priorities in this section, the highest being for Pre-19 Education and Access and Skills (see Chart 4).



- There was a high level of agreement with all three priorities in the Work section with an average of 84% agreement (see Chart 5).



- On average, 89% of people who expressed an opinion agreed with the priorities in the Relax section. Levels of agreement were high for all the priorities ranging from 83% to 96% (see Chart 6).



Neighbourhoods and Diverse Communities Feedback

- Feedback forms were given to the 74 people who attended the Neighbourhoods and Diverse Communities Event. Of those given out, 14 were returned.
- 9 out of the 12 people who responded agreed with the Draft Vision compared to just one who disagreed.
- There was a high level of agreement with all the commitments across the four themes of Live, Learn, Work and Relax. On average:
 - 91% of people agreed with the commitments set out under Live.
 - 98% of people agreed with the commitments set out under Learn.
 - 93% of people agreed with the commitments set out under Work.
 - 92% of people agreed with the commitments set out under Relax.

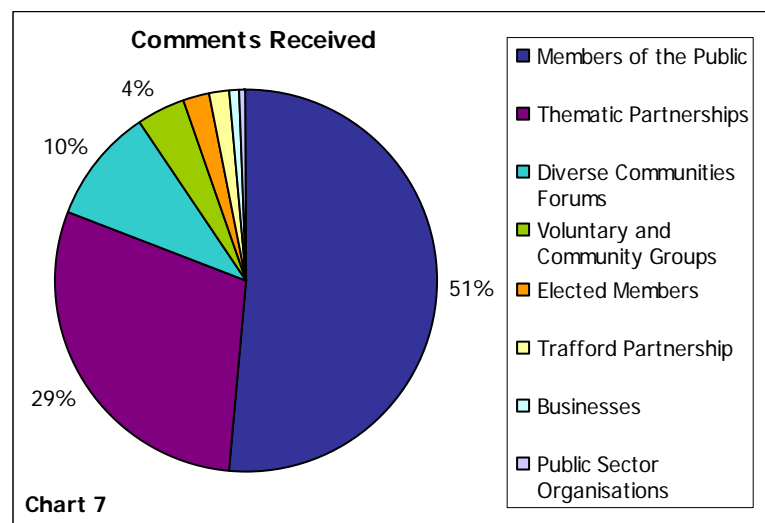
Overall Comments

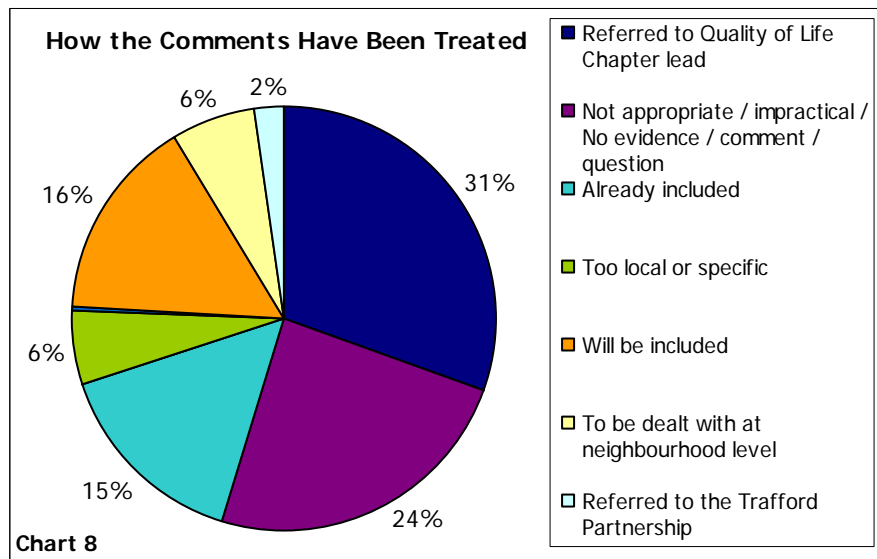

- In total, over 50% of the comments were received from members of the public through the Neighbourhood Forums, individual feedback, the Neighbourhoods and Diverse Communities Event and the web consultation (see Chart 7).



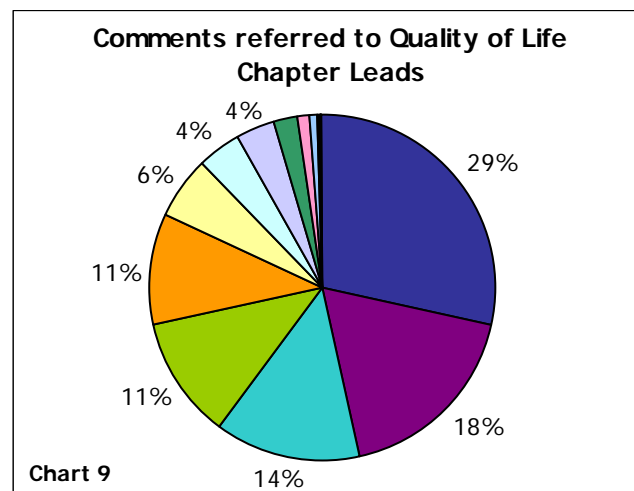
- The comments have all been dealt with in different ways as illustrated by Chart 8 below. Just under one third of the comments have been referred to the relevant Quality of Life

Chapter lead, 16% of the comments have been included in the refreshed Sustainable Community Strategy, and it was considered that a further 15% were already included in the Strategy.



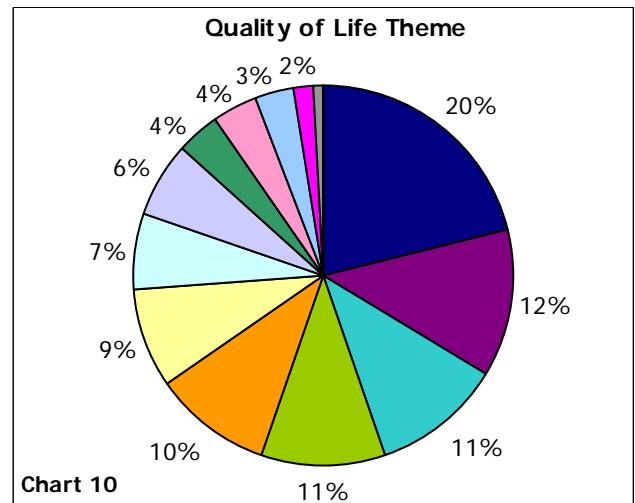
- Of the 478 comments referred to the Quality of Life Chapter leads, 28% have been referred to Prosperous Trafford, 18% to Clean and Green Trafford, 14% to Better Transport, 11% to Safer Trafford and 11% to Bright Futures.

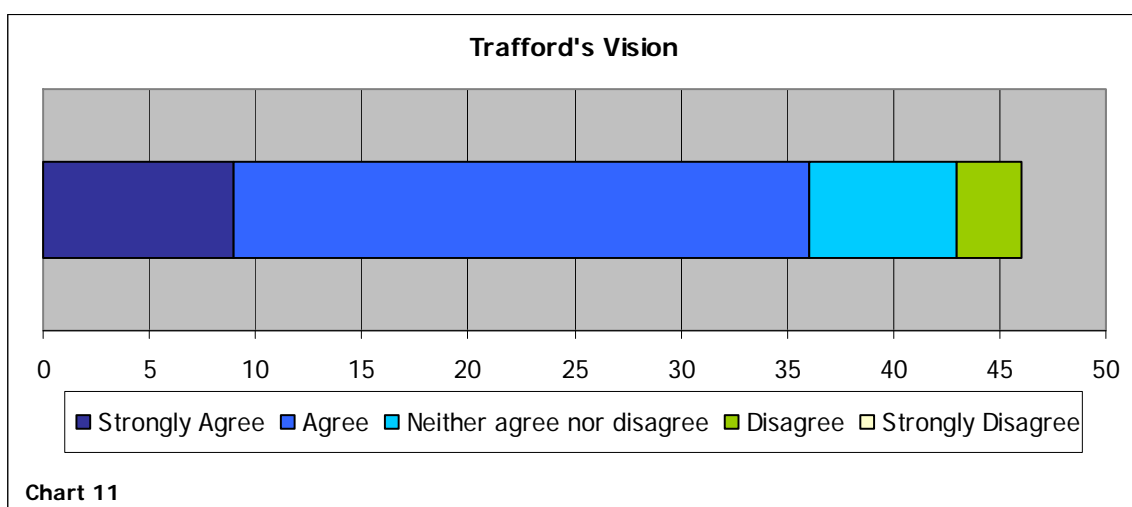
- All the comments were analysed and grouped by quality of life theme. 21% of the comments weren't specifically related to any of the themes. Of the remaining, the most frequently made comments were on the economy (12%), environment (11%), transport (11%) and neighbourhood (10%).

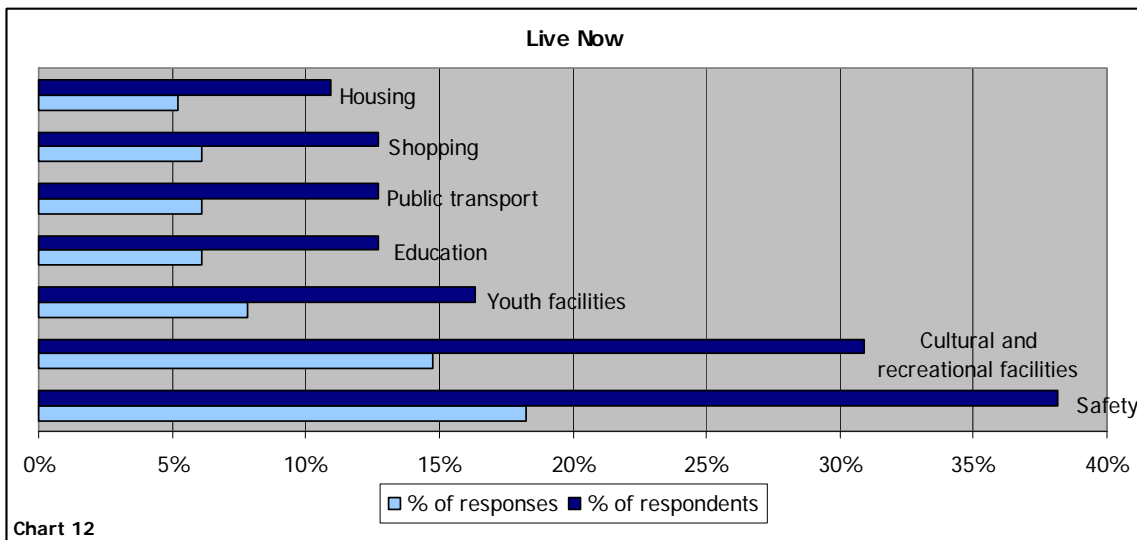


Children and Young People's Event

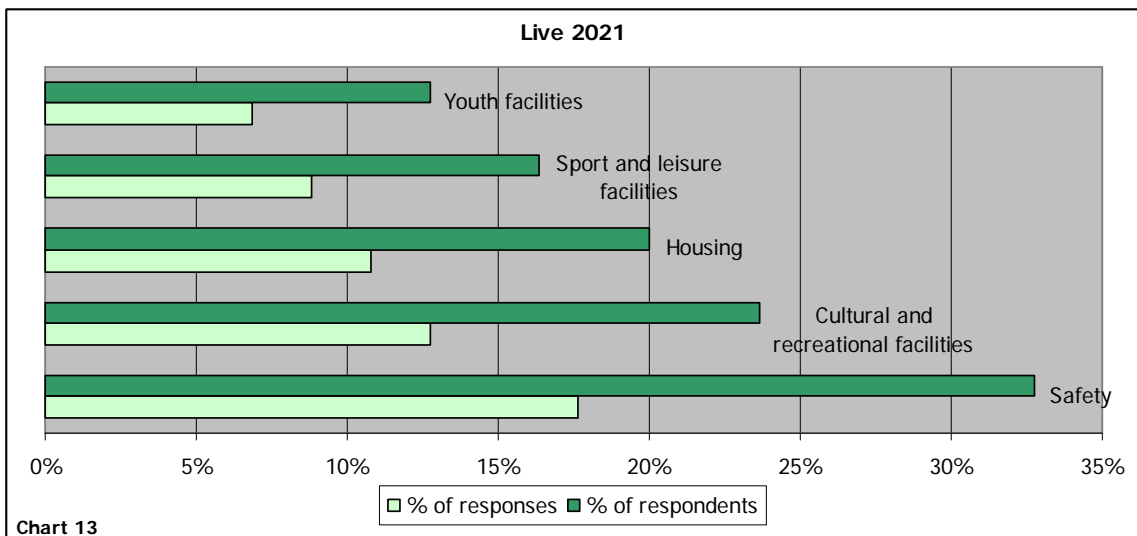
- At this event 55 young people were interviewed about their views on the draft vision for Trafford and what is important to them about Trafford as a place to live, learn, work and relax now and in 2021.
- To help the young people gain a perspective of what life would be like in 2021, they were asked how old they would be then. The ages ranged from 24 to 31, with 72% falling between the ages of 26 to 28.
- 78% of those who responded agreed with the Vision for Trafford (20% Strongly Agree; 59% Agree) compared to just 7% who disagreed.



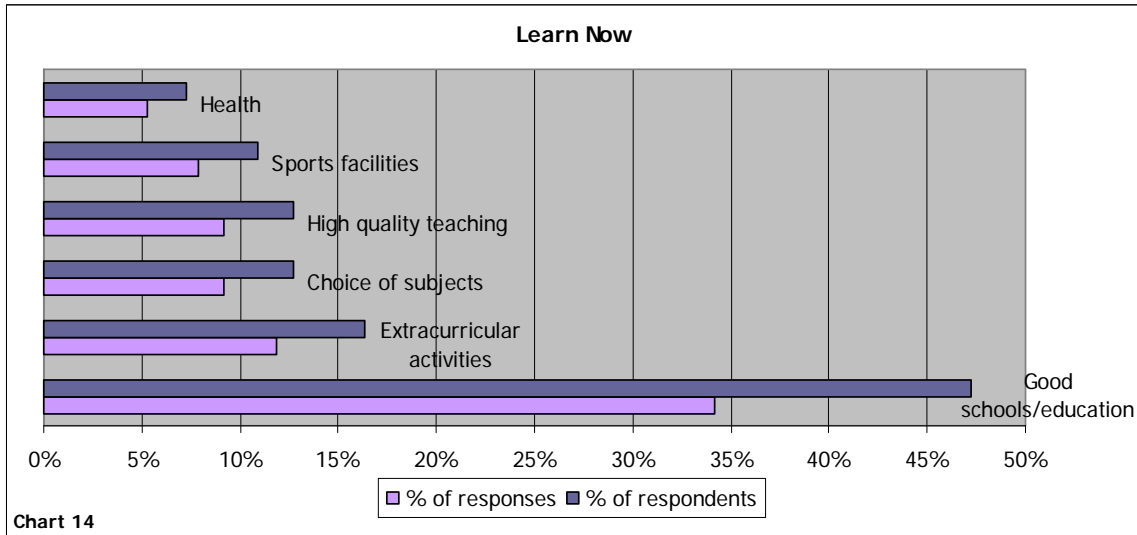
- The answers to the remaining questions were then analysed and grouped into categories for each of the themes Live, Learn, Work, Relax, Getting to Places and Caring for the Environment.
- The young people we spoke to gave over 100 responses about what was important to them about Trafford as a place to live now. The most common responses were those related to safety (38% respondents) and cultural and recreational facilities (31% of respondents). Other important factors included youth facilities (16% of respondents), education (13% of respondents), public transport (13% of respondents), shopping (13% of respondents) and housing (11% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 1).



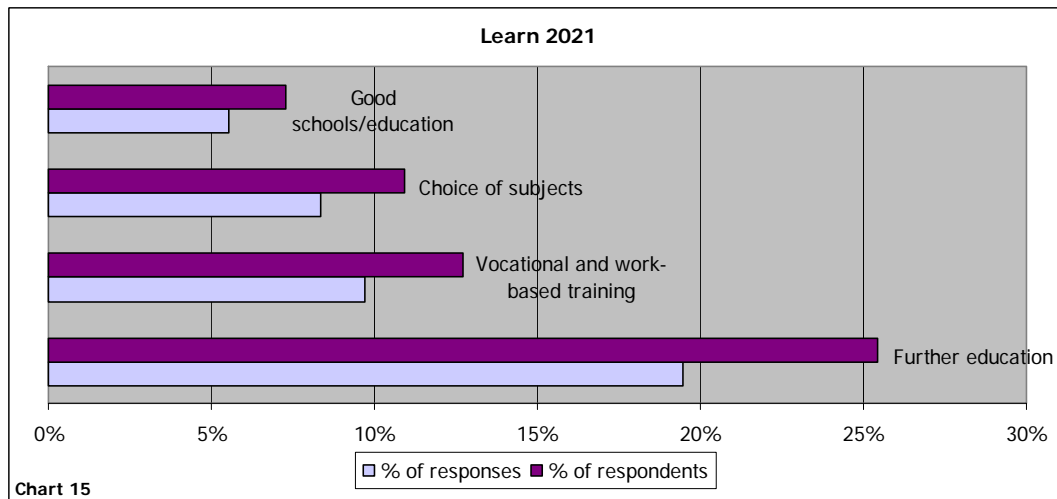
- Over 100 responses were given by the young people for what was important to them about Trafford as a place to live in 2021. As with Trafford as a place to live now, the most common answers given were those around safety (33% of respondents) and cultural and recreational facilities (24% of respondents). Other common responses included housing (20% of respondents), sports and leisure facilities (16% of respondents) and youth facilities (13% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 2).



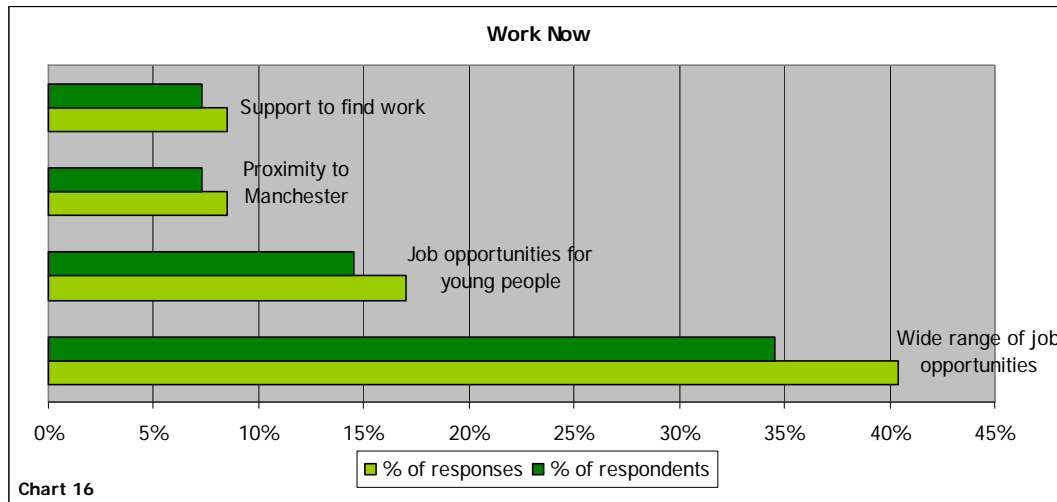
- Over 70 responses were given by the young people in answer to what is important to them about Trafford as a place to learn now. Having good schools and education came out on top with 47% of the young people giving this as an answer. Other common responses given included having extracurricular activities (16% of respondents), a good choice of subjects (13% of respondents) and high quality teaching (13% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 3).



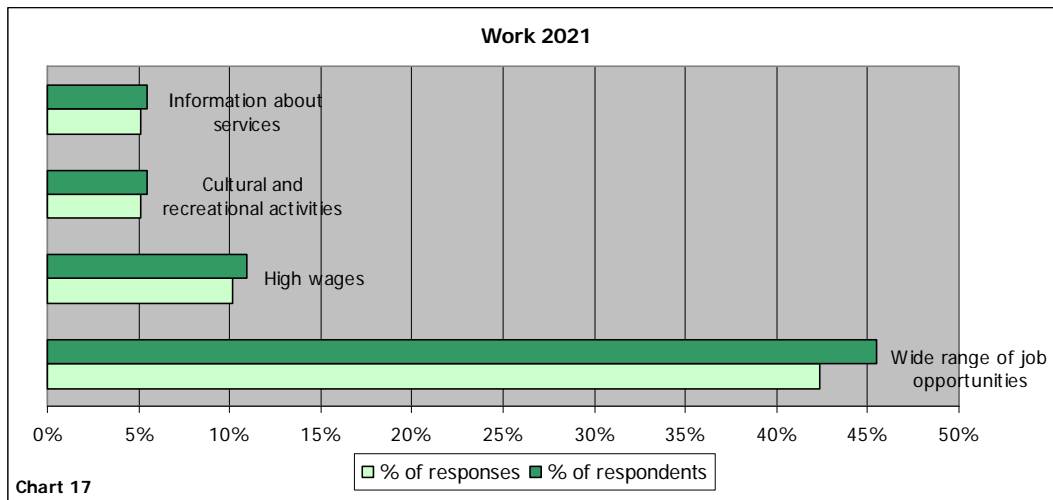
- The young people we spoke to gave over 70 responses about what was important to them about Trafford as a place to learn in 2021. Further education was the most common response given with a quarter of respondents giving this as an answer. Other important issues included vocational and work-based training (13% of respondents), having a good choice of subjects (11% of respondents) and good schools and education (7% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 4).



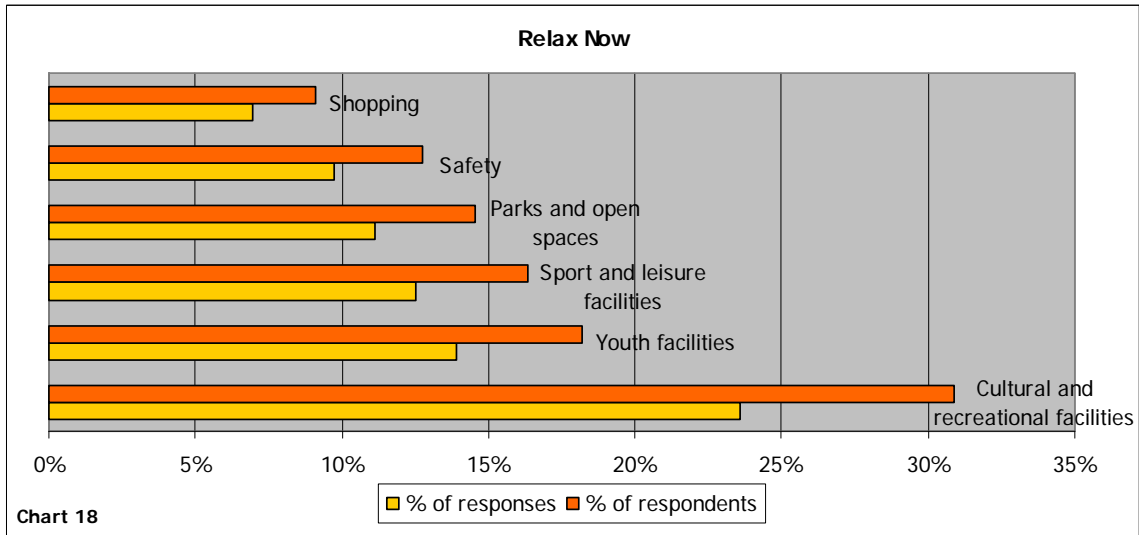
- Almost 50 responses were given by the young people in answer to what is important to them about Trafford as a place to work now. Having a wide range of job opportunities available was the most common answer given by the young people (35% of respondents) followed by job opportunities for young people (15% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 5).



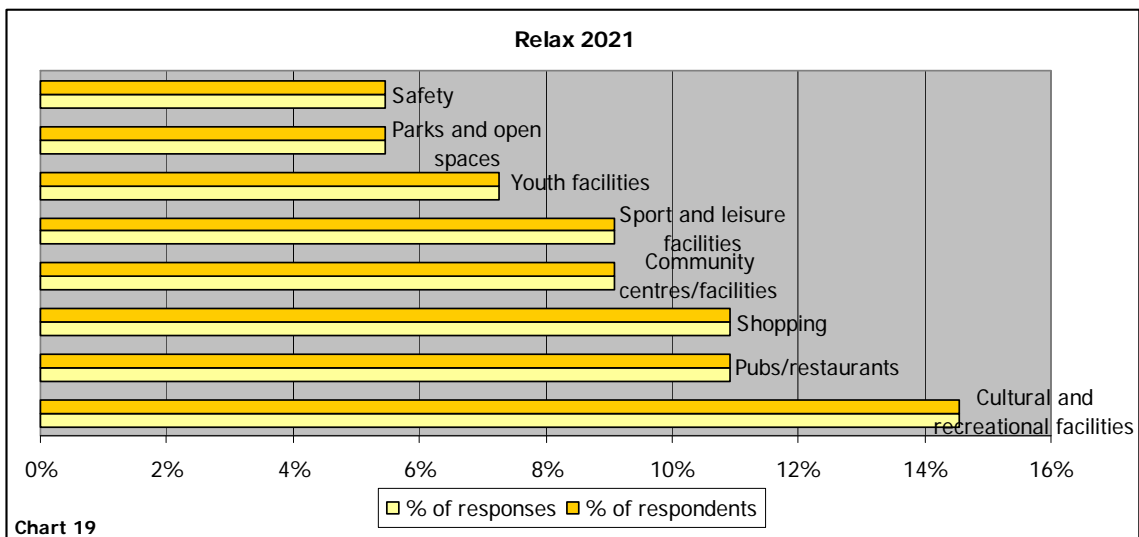
- The young people gave over 50 responses about what was important to them about Trafford as a place to work in 2021. The most frequently given answers were in relation to having a wide range of job opportunities (45% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 6).



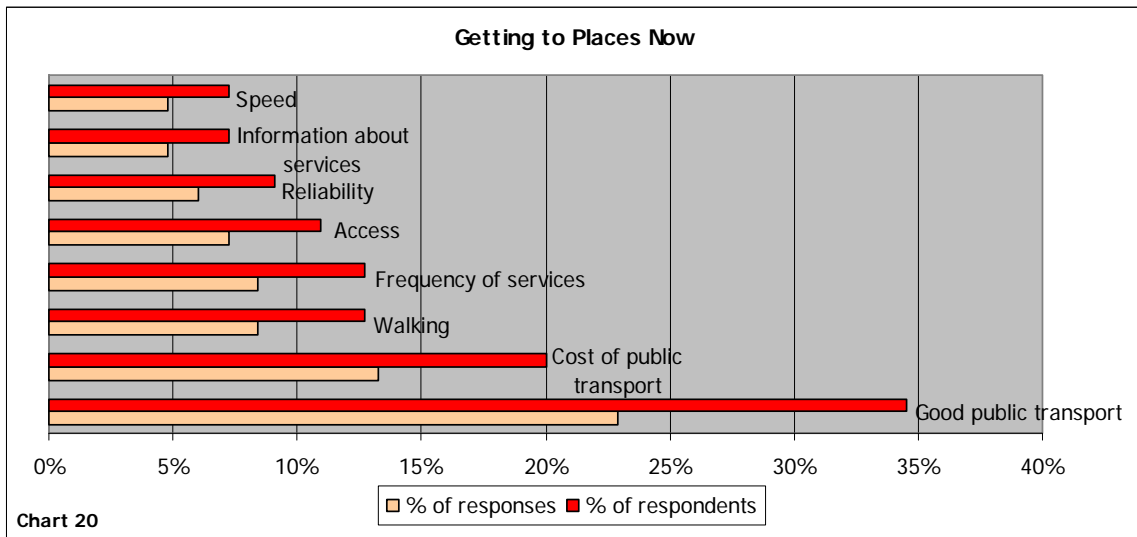
- Over 70 responses were given by the young people about what was important to them about Trafford as a place to relax now. The most common responses were those related to cultural and recreational facilities (31% of respondents). Youth facilities (18% of respondents), sport and leisure facilities (16% of respondents) and parks and open spaces (15% of respondents) were also considered important factors (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 7).



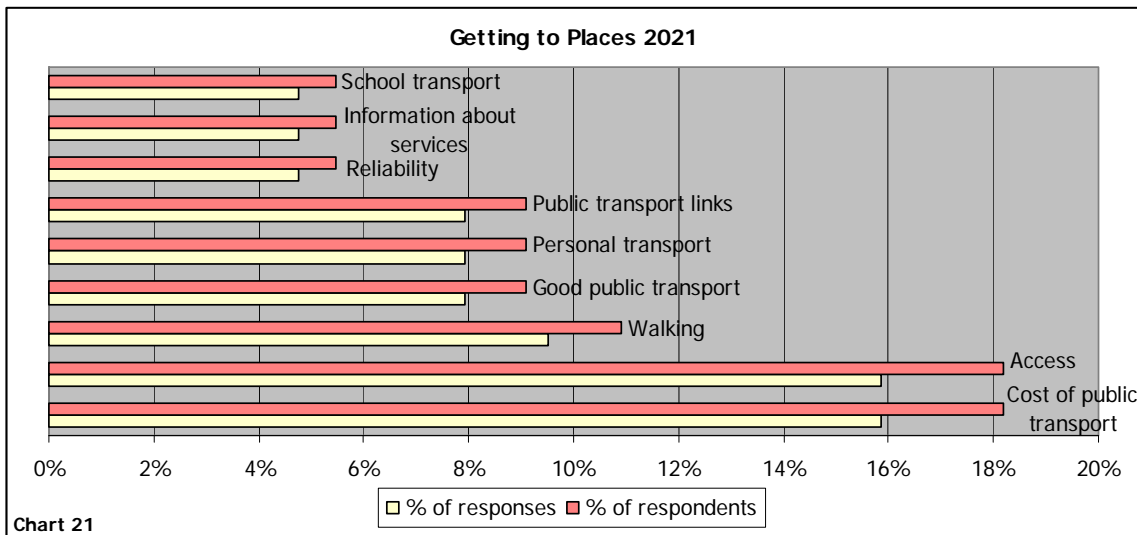
- Fewer responses were received from the young people about what was important to them about Trafford as a place to relax in 2021 than now (just over 50 responses). The responses were spread over a range of different answers with the most common being cultural and recreational facilities (15% of respondents), pubs and restaurants (11% of respondents) and shopping (11% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 8).



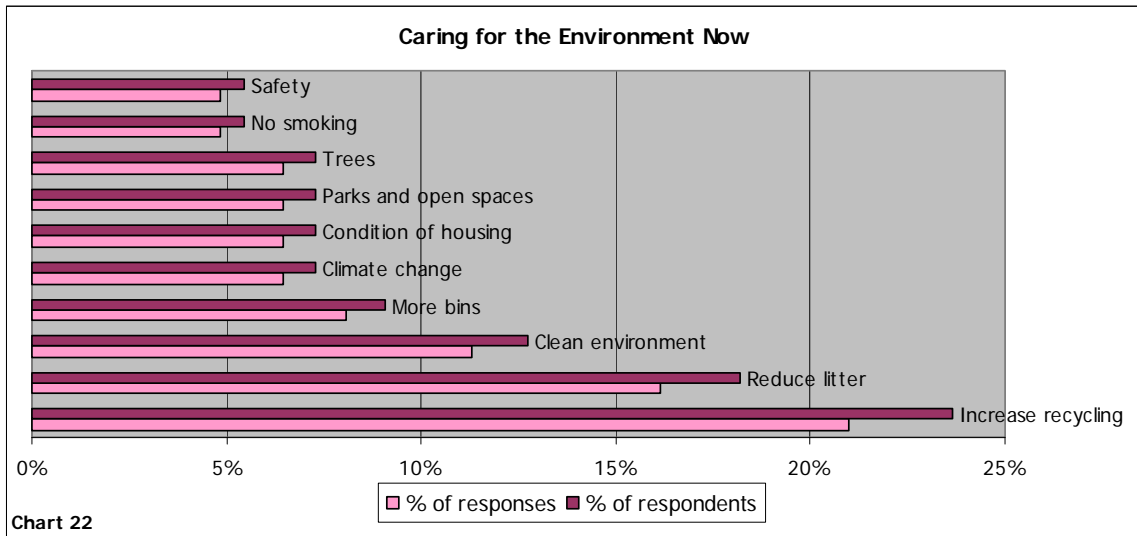
- The young people gave over 80 responses in answer to what is important to them getting to places now. The most common responses were related to good quality public transport (35% of respondents) and the cost of public transport (20% of respondents). Other important issues included walking (13% of respondents) and frequency of services (13% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 9).



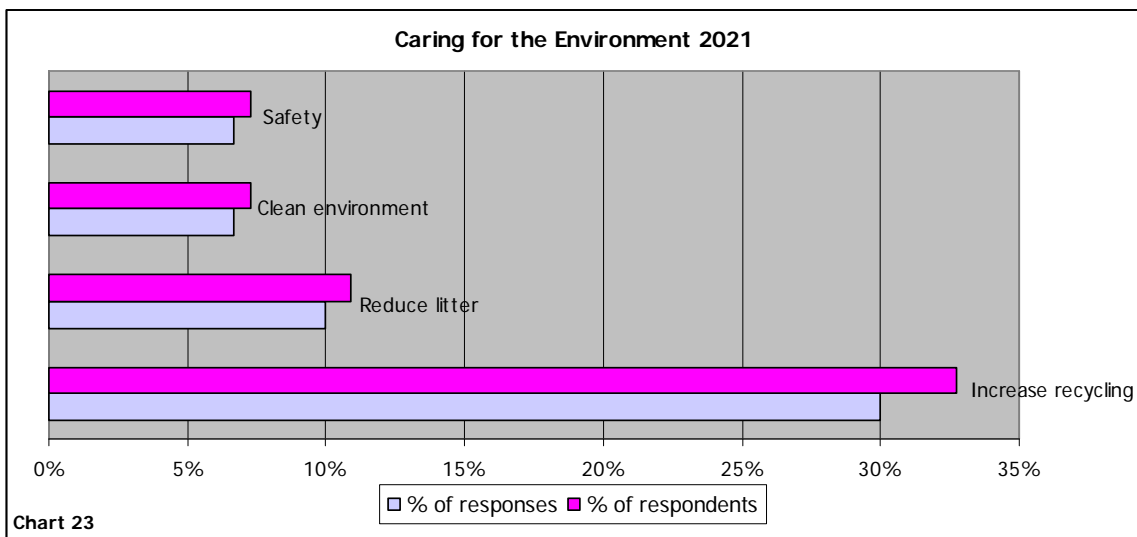
- Over 60 responses were given by the young people about what was important to them about getting to places in 2021. The main issues for the young people were the cost of public transport (18% of respondents) and access (18% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 10).



- Over 60 responses were given by the young people about what was important to them about caring for the environment now. The most important issues for young people were increasing recycling (24% of respondents), reducing litter (18% of respondents) and a clean environment (13% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 11).



- The young people gave 60 responses in answer to what is important to them about caring for the environment in 2021. As with caring for the environment now, the most common responses were given in relation to increasing recycling (33% of respondents) and reducing litter (11% of respondents) (for full details see Appendix 4, Table 12).
